The 2023 PANZ conference was held at the University of Auckland / Waipapa Taumata Rau in late August 2023. It was a well-attended and lively event, with a jam-packed programme of presentations, panels and posters.

Keynote speakers included Ganesh Nana, former Productivity Commissioner Associate Professor Collin Tukuitonga, Pacific Dean of Auckland University's Medical School, Associate Professor Sarah-Jane Paine (Ngāi Tūhoe) Research Director of Growing Up in New Zealand, and Associate Professor Celia McMichael, human geography specialist in climate change impact on the Pacific.

The conference featured a special panel on Indigenous Data Sovereignty with Kirikowhai Mikaere (Te Arawa – Tūhourangi, Ngāti Whakaue), Associate Professor Donna Cormack (Kai Tahu, Kāti Mamoe) and Sam Manuela, Pacific Data Sovereignty Committee member. Chaired by Prof Tahu Kukutai.

Thanks again to all who were involved including the conference sponsors <u>Stats NZ</u>, <u>Te Ngira Institute for Population Research</u>, Centre for Research Evaluation and Social Impact (CRESA), Dot Loves Data and Infometrics.

In memory of the late Emeritus Professor Ian Pool, CNZM FRSNZ, we brought together a special panel including PANZ Life members and invited them to reflect on critical issues for population in Aotearoa.

Technical seminars to get ready for the release of 2023 Census data

Data users are invited to attend a technical seminar to prepare for the release of 2023 Census data from the end of May 2024.

The seminars will support customers with an interest in how the data is produced and what to expect from 2023 Census data releases. Topics will include

- products and services and the release schedule
- new and changed data outputs
- data quality framework
- combined census methodology (including administrative data sources)
- where to find metadata (information about 2023 Census data and methods).

Seminars will be held in May 2024. In-person seminar locations include Auckland, Hamilton, Wellington, Christchurch, Dunedin, and we are also planning online sessions on 3 and 16 May.

Update on the 2023 Post-enumeration Survey

The 2023 Post-enumeration Survey (PES) is a household survey of about 16,500 households, undertaken shortly after the census to evaluate the completeness of census coverage. The PES provides the official coverage and response rates for the 2023 Census. It is a critical input for producing accurate population estimates and projections after the census.

Following a successful field operation carried out in 2023, the focus is now on processing the collected survey data – this includes linking of PES records to census and administrative data to determine who was missed by the census, and who was counted more than once or counted in error.

Last year we published a number of methods papers and privacy impact assessments. These publications include survey design documents and information on the data-linking processes and tools developed for use in the 2023 PES.

The first release of PES results is expected in late 2024.

A message from Professor Lisette Burrows, Director

I am just getting my toes under the table as the incoming director for Te Ngira Institute for Population Research and loving it. I have taught and researched in Health and Physical Education for many years at The School of Physical Education, Te Whare Wānanga o Ōtākou and for the past six years have been working at Te Huataki Waiora, Te Whare Wānanga o Waikato in the community health field. While neither of these may seem an obvious fit for an Institute focused on population research, I'm finding there is much we share in terms of vision and approach.

One of the many appeals of Te Ngira is the diversity of disciplinary understandings drawn on in the Institute's research. Another is the obvious impact this research has in policy and community domains. And of course, a key feature of Te Ngira is the people.

I am really looking forward to meeting PANZ people and growing my understanding of this forum, which from the outside seems like a vibrant and generous community who do much to grow our grasp of the implications of population change here and elsewhere.

In terms of Te Ngira news, in the past couple of weeks, Shefali Pawar has presented on NZ demographic trends to the 2024 New Zealand Economics Forum (see below), Polly Atatoa-Carr headed to London to contribute to an international policy workshop on child health, Tahu Kukutai contributed to an Indigenous data symposium in Washington and Nikki Barrett will be joining us on an Erihapeti Rehu-Murchie Fellowship to work on 'Tino rangatiratanga through Kaupapa Māori pregnancy and parenting solutions'.

I would relish hearing from members of the PANZ community and will hopefully meet many of you at the next conference if not before!

The University of Waikato Management School hosted the <u>2024 NZ</u> <u>Economics Forum</u> on 15 and 16 February. The Forum was themed 'A Briefing to the Incoming Government', and attracted attendees from business, policy, academia, and the non-profit sector. A number of students were also able to attend the event.

The first day included a panel discussion titled 'Demographics are destiny; who are we going to be in 2050?. PANZ Secretary Shefali Pawar was on the panel alongside Distinguished Professor Emeritus Paul Spoonley and Sarah Baddeley (MartinJenkins). On the second day, PANZ Vice-President Professor Michael Cameron was on a panel discussing social investment. You can watch recordings of both days here.

New Zealand saw its **lowest** annual natural increase in population in 80 years during 2023, and the lowest number of live births in 20 year, according to Stats NZ data.

This was <u>widely covered in the media</u> and PANZ members were called on by media to comment.

Assoc Prof Bryndl Hohmann-Marriot commented on the implications on TVNZ 1 News.

Tahu Kukutai discussed the fertility 'double whammy' of declining fertility and population ageing, the differences between Māori and Pakeha, what this means for Aotearoa NZ and why this is not really 'news' with <u>Jenny-May Clarkson on TVNZ Breakfast</u>.
